Things have improved a little for me and so four weeks ago, I decided to go back to my dog training. This was quite a giant step for me, as I was afraid of not being able to walk in a straight line and possibly losing my balance. I coped better than I thought and so I decided to try and get my last two dogs through their Gold awards. I was delighted when Wispa gained his after just three lessons.

I then decided to take my last dog, Robbie, to try for his Gold. Robbie is my oldest and probably the most set in his ways and having a mind of his own. I knew this was going to be a big challenge and I didn't hold out much hope for him ever doing it. I took him along last week to a local club and explained that he was going to be a challenge and that I expected to be training him for months.

I was informed that they were actually holding the Gold test the following week and that I could have an attempt at it. I said that I didn't think there was any chance of him being able to do it. I stayed for the training session for an hour and was persuaded to have a go at it.

Well, a week later, I am still reeling from the shock of it. He did every exercise perfectly, including his out of sight stay while another dog was running around him out of control!

Is this a record? Two dogs through Gold in one week and one dog only having had one training session? The last time these dogs did any training was two years ago. Not only are they a credit to the breed, they have given me back my confidence and a reason to carry on with my life again. I am just full of admiration for them.

I already owned an 8 year old blue merle Sheltie, Myndoc Sea of Dreams, (Penny), who took me to the Olympia Finals in 2008, and the Crufts Small Team final in 2011.

In 2009 I fell in love with Ava, who belongs to Linda King. She and Nicola put me in touch with her breeder Kay Hateley, who was doing a repeat mating.

I gave Poppy some basic Agility training and because it involved food for rewards, she became very keen. Unfortunately, before she was old enough to compete, I had a replacement hip, so my husband Clive had to take over.

At her first KC indoor show, she won the Grade 1-3 jumping by 7 seconds, while I was in hospital. However, at her first outdoor show less than 8 weeks after my operation, I had to run her due to Clive being called upon the last minute to judge. Poppy was a little star, running ahead and following instructions from a distance, whilst I hobbled round. She won the 1-3 Agility and became Grade 4.

When she quickly got up to Grade 6, Clive took over as I couldn't run fast enough. In 2013 she won two C.C.'s in Scotland, Kingdom of Fife and East Lothian. She also had a R.C.C. at Weardale that year.

Poppy was picked for inclusion in the Team GB squad for the European and FCI World Championships, 2014, but unfortunately, was picked as non-travelling reserve.

Bad luck struck in July last year at the East Lothian Champ. Show when Clive tore the top of his ham-string whilst running in the Jumping qualifier. As a result he wasn't able to run her for the next few months, so I had to take over. She gradually got used to my handling again, and managed a 4th in the Dundee Champ. final.

The highlight for me was when we got the R.C.C. at the Wilton Show in August, 2014. I'm sure that if Clive could have run she would have been a Champion by now!

In spite of his injury, Clive 'ran' the Olympia Semi Finals at the KC Festival, in August, managing to qualify for the Finals, in spite of his ham-string giving way part way round. Poppy was again a little star, and kept running to come 9th. The top 10 qualify.

December 19th last year I was thrilled to watch Clive and Poppy in the Olympia Finals for the second year running, when this time she did better, coming 4th, and 2nd in the pairs with her Poodle partner. We are very proud of this independent little dog, and thank Kay for breeding her.

Those of you who work in Obedience will know Sarah and some of you may remember the inspiring Sheltie Camp several years ago at which Sarah and her mother Barbara were the trainers.

Sarah started competing in Obedience in 1989, and won her first Novice that year (winning out of Beginners). Since then she has had 129 wins Novice to Ch 'C' (112 with Groenendaels) at Open and Champ shows.

She has qualified four dogs for Ticket, 3 Groens and a Collie. Two of the Groens became Obedience Champions, Ob Ch Vanistica Gideons Moon (who won 4 Tickets and was 3rd at Crufts in 1995) and Ob Ch Vanistica's French Eclipse (who won 5 Tickets and competed as part of the winning England World Cup team in 2009; they were also 4th in the Individual World Cup placings that year).

Sarah is currently working a 5 year old Groenendael (Wally) and a 2 year old BC (Rogan) in 'A' and 'B'. Wally won 2 'A's this year after an 18 month lay off and won the Class 'A' Championships at the inaugural Class Championships in November. Rogan won 2 Novices and an 'A' this year and was 3rd in the Class 'A' Championships.

She also judges up to and including Championship 'C' and currently trains seven Ticket handlers (4 with BCs, 2 with Goldies and 1 with a Groenendael). She says "I love training the other breeds as well as the Collies and I think it helps that I have trained both up to Ticket level as they are very different in their attitudes."

Sheltie Rally Training Day

Saturday 21st November 2015



Rally is the latest discipline for dogs that has been recognised by the Kennel Club. It involves working your dog around a numbered course of Obedience-based exercises. There are six levels and each dog and handler team start at Level 1, which is performed on lead. Levels 3 to 6 are performed off lead. It is designed to be fun, yet still offering challenges, especially at the higher levels.

There are 30 exercises at Level 1 and these are the foundation for progression. In competition, you enter the ring with 200 points and the course is timed. Deductions are made for any faults, (e.g. tight lead) and in the event of a tie on points, the fastest time wins. A qualifying round is 170 points or more and three qualifying rounds take you up to the next level.

Some examples of exercises are shown below: -



The trainers will be Lynne Moulson and Karen Marek: –

Lynne has had Shelties for nearly thirty years and has a background of Agility and Heelwork to Music. Rally was taken up to help improve the focus with one of those Shelties – Tiffy – and liking it so much, they went on to compete. Tiffy excelled herself at her first Level 3 trial and achieved first place with a perfect score. Now looking to achieve their final qualifier at Level 3, they are looking forward to the challenges of competing at Level 4 and training for Levels 5 and 6. Another dog that Lynne works is Katie, who only started competing in 2014, but has steadily worked through Levels 1 and 2, achieving a placed rosette each time and will start 2015 at Level 3. Lynne also teaches Rally to members of the Agility club where she trains and a few of the people have gone on to compete successfully.

Karen has had Shelties for many years and competed in Obedience with her late Sheltie Harry and then Pippin. Rally was taken up as a change to Obedience which Pippin has excelled in, not only qualifying but gaining first place on four consecutive Rally trials in 2014. Pippin and Karen are looking to achieve their last Level 3 and qualify Level 4's in 2015, whilst training for Levels 5 and 6. Karen is also training her latest Sheltie Toby who may be ready for a trial late in 2015.

Alongside learning about Rally, the training day will revolve around having fun with your Shelties. So please bring tasty treats and/or a toy for your dogs.

The training will start at 9.30 a.m. and will last until 5.00 p.m. with an hour break for lunch. There will also be short coffee breaks during the morning and afternoon. Teas and coffees will be provided but please bring a packed lunch with you.

Sheltie Obedience Training Day Saturday 22nd November 2014

Trainer: Keith Gwillim

Can I say first of all a big thank you to our trainer for the day, Keith Gwillim, whose vast experience in dog Obedience is obvious. He was able to pass on to us his knowledge of training any dog. Although he doesn't have Shelties himself, he had a very soft and calm way of training the group, which the Shelties warmed to. Purely based on reward training, this meant that those Shelties who love food were well fed that day, and those who were keener on playing as a reward were also very happy. There were a range of dogs at the training day, from pet Obedience dogs to those working 'A'/'B' level.

I really went to the training day to pick up some useful training tips to pass on to my local group of Sheltie owners. We hire a hall once a week to meet up and do a bit of Obedience for the fun of it. I "volunteered" to act as a trainer at the group, as I have had quite a bit of success in Agility, and in training Agility. Some of them have loved it so much that they've started entering a few Obedience shows, mainly the ESSC Limited Obedience Show, but others have given it a go at a couple of local Open Shows with varying degrees of success. Having now 'retired' from Agility, I still haven't plucked up the courage to enter any Obedience open shows as I haven't felt I have the accuracy to put myself and my dog on 'public' display.

PLAY

Keith started by getting us all onto the floor with our dogs and playing with them to warm them up. He could then also see what kind of relationship each handler had with their dogs. He then got us to practice getting our dogs to the correct heel position by asking us to step to the side a couple of inches at a time. This is to make the dogs move sideways into the heel position, having to think about where their bodies are in relation to their handler's left leg. I must admit that my little Sheltie 'Dee-Dee' struggled with this as she has really only been taught pet Obedience, having never had the perfect heel position worked on in the past.

NOVICE RECALL

We then worked our dogs individually, starting with the Novice Recall. It was good to watch all the other handlers and dogs very carefully,

and to listen to what Keith was saying to correct their faults. He got some handlers to set their dog up in the wait, leaving their dog, walking half way down the room, then turning a full 360 degrees and continuing away until being told to face their dog. Little tricks like that get the dog thinking all the time, not knowing what will come next. Continually practicing a full Novice Recall may encourage dogs to anticipate the next manoeuvre – hence breaks in the wait, 'finishing' before being asked, etc. Another trick is to throw a toy or food through your legs as your dog is coming to you. This encourages a nice fast recall, so much so that some dogs slid to a halt at their handler's legs when doing a proper recall after this exercise.

RETRIEVE

The Retrieve exercise was also taught in different ways, according to the dog's ability. Some handlers put their dog in a Wait and walked away holding the dumbbell, placing it on the floor and continuing to walk away from their dog. On turning to face their dog they would call it and the dog would pick up the dumbbell en route to its handler. This makes sure that the dog is always picking up the dumbbell whilst facing its handler. It also makes the exercise a lot quieter than when lobbing a hard dumbbell across the floor.

Another exercise is to hold the dumbbell while facing your dog. Get your dog to hold the dumbbell, then you return to the dog's side. Then go back to face your dog again, and keep repeating this.

Another exercise is to throw your dumbbell out, then you race your dog to get it. This makes the dog keen to go and retrieve.

For Dee-Dee, who doesn't like retrieving, I was told to throw out a treat, call her back to me, throw out another treat, call her back to me, then throw out a soft retrieve article. I can vouch that this does work. My next step will be to gradually introduce a lightweight dumbbell (the bought ones are far too heavy for her size). I was worried that she doesn't 'present' as she should, but I was assured I could work on that at a later date. She will now bring a soft toy back to me and not drop it, so that's quite a progression.

HEELWORK

The standard of the dogs' Heelwork varied greatly. The 'A' and 'B' handlers were really refining their heelwork on an individual basis with Keith. I was just amazed at how good some Shelties could be at sticking like glue to their handler's leg.

Many Shelties, including mine, had difficulty moving their bottom on a left turn. To help with that Keith got me to turn only a fraction to my left, then wait for her to work it out that her bottom was too far out. Bless her, after several attempts she was eventually starting to move her bottom independently. I needed to slow down my right and left turns to give her time to move her body in line with my side.

Another little tip to get a good position is to hold a treat cupped in your left hand, then place your hand on your leg, the cup facing rearwards, and get your dog to nuzzle into the cupped hand without getting the treat. Once your dog is walking at heel in the correct position, let your dog have the treat – and repeat this continually. This is quite a difficult manoeuvre with a small dog (quite easy with a larger dog).

Keith was encouraging me to enter some Pre-Beginner classes as this may make me realise there are already other dogs out there competing who are of a similar standard to Dee-Dee. Maybe!

SCENT

Many of the dogs were brilliant at the Scent exercise, but Keith started with the basic 'A' level Scent – a row of five sterile cloths with the handler's cloth somewhere in the lineup. Most of them could do this easily, with a couple having upturned saucers on top of the sterile cloths to discourage their dogs from snatching the wrong cloths en route to their own. Dee-Dee has a habit of 'tasting' each cloth on the way to her own, so Keith got me to place a tiny treat on the floor in front of each sterile cloth. Wasn't sure this would work, but hey presto she ate every treat and never picked up a wrong cloth. She then happily retrieved her cloth and came running back to me – no sit present at this stage but that's work in progress.

The more experienced Shelties tried the 'B' scent which involves a dummy scent cloth being placed amongst the line of sterile cloths, then the handler's cloth being put down too. Absolutely fabulous to watch – some dogs didn't even sniff along the cloth line – they went straight to their own cloth.

For those of you who've never been to a training day, I can thoroughly recommend it. No matter what stage you are at, the expert trainers will be able to help you. So next year we hope to see more of you there having a go.
